The Muse Polyhymnia depicted in a dreamy, pensive pose, is completely wrapped in a mantle and leaning on a rocky spur. The young Muse holds a papyrus roll, the symbol of her art of sacred poetry. This is a splendid Roman (Antonine Age) copy of the group of Muses created by Philiskos of Rhodes in the second century BC. The original polish of the work is preserved in perfect condition because the statue was hidden in antiquity in an underground tunnel.

We have chosen the image of Janus, one of the earliest gods of Rome, to serve as our logo for this University. In Roman mythology, Janus was the god of gates, doors, doorways, beginnings, and endings. His most apparent remnant in modern culture is his namesake, the month of January.

Janus has a distinctive appearance. Though he was usually depicted with two faces looking in opposite directions Janus Geminus (twin Janus) or (Bifrons), in some places he was Janus Quadrifrons (the four-faced). The Romans associated Janus with the Etruscan deity Ani in that he is commonly depicted with two faces — one regarding what is behind and the other looking toward what lies ahead.

Janus was frequently used to symbolize change and transitions such as the progression of past to future, of one condition to another, of one vision to another, and of one universe to another. Hence, Janus was worshipped at the beginnings of the harvest and planting times, as well as marriages, births and other beginnings. He also represented the transition between primitive life and civilization, between the countryside and the city, peace and war, and the growing-up of young people.

Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome who followed Romulus, gave the city a solid beginning on a sound basis of law and religious observance. He instituted the Temple of Janus, an important Roman monument, whose doors were left open in time of war so that the gods could come to the help of the Romans, but kept closed in time of peace.

Throughout our Greek and Roman odyssey we will be exploring the development of mankind — intellectually, artistically, culturally and philosophically. As Janus is representative of contemplation on the past while looking forward to the new, we too, will be using the knowledge we gain from the ancients, to chart a new course for the next phase of our leadership in our businesses, communities and families.

Proper Documentation

Passports are required for all registrants. At this time, visas are not required to enter any of the ports of call on our University journey. If there is a change in international policy, we will notify you in advance of travel. Silverseas staff will facilitate the visa process on board the ship prior to entering a country if the port authority requires documentation.

Climate

Warm summer temperatures and sunny days can be expected during our voyage. Occasional, brief rain showers may occur on the islands.

Clothing

Smart, casual, comfortable clothing is suggested for daytime education sessions and offsites. Please be advised that shorts, bare shoulders and miniskirts are not advised while in the city or when visiting churches. Comfortable rubber soled shoes are a must when visiting archaeological sites. Hats, sunglasses and sunscreen should be brought along for off-ship excursions.



MEDITERRANEAN NIGHTS

As the sun sets over the Acropolis on Thursday evening, our Mediterranean journey will be just beginning! Our YPO Greek hosts and social co-chairs for the evening Nadia and Takis Theocharakis (Aegean) have planned a very special reception and dinner reflecting Olympia of Ancient Greece. Travel back in time as we enjoy a marvelous program in the graceful rotunda of Záppeion Hall. Designed by Danish architect Theophil Hansen between 1874 and 1888, the hall was used in the first modern Olympic Games in 1896. The hall was once the Greek State Radio headquarters and was donated by national benefactor, Evangelos Záppas for the purpose of hosting important international events. The hall has a long history including serving as the offices of the Greek President of the European Union, the Olympic village for the 1896 Games and the location of the signing of Greece's accession to the European Economic Community on 29 May 1979.







EVENINGS AT SEA

Friday, September 8th we will embark the Silver Wind to begin our voyage as we sail from Athens beneath Cape Sounion. Our YPO friends from Istanbul will join us as we enjoy Turkish music, entertainment and food in preparation for our arrival in Ephesus.

During our late afternoon visit of Ephesus on Saturday, September 9th, gather in the Odeion for a lecture and musical performance prior to visiting this vast archeological site. The small outdoor Odeion theatre served as a council chamber and was built around 150 by Publius Vedius Antonius and his wife Flavia Papiana, members of a distinguished family in Ephesus.

An ancient Greek and Roman dinner will follow in the Celsus Library. Completed in 117, the Library was built by Tiberius Julius Aquila as a mausoleum for his father Tiberius Julius Celsus who was a consul in Rome in charge of all public buildings. The sarcophagus of Celsus is located in a tomb under the apsidal wall in the library. This beautiful building reflects the characteristics of the age of Emperor Hadrian. Co-Chairs for this evening in Ephesus are Feleksan and Hamdi Onar (Istanbul).

On September 10th our Social Co-Chairs Nadia and Takis Theocharakis (Aegean) have planned a wonderful night on the island of Mykonos, beginning at sunset on Sunday evening with cocktails in the town followed by dinner on the beach. Later, those who want to dance the night away can head off to some of Mykonos' most fashionable clubs with Greek YPOers.

Following a day discovering Delos privately on Monday September 11th, members will have drinks and dinner on deck aboard the Silver Wind, celebrating Greek and Roman mythology, astronomy and astrology.

Things heat up on Tuesday **September 12th** as we set sail from Santorini. Enjoy a special volcanic themed dinner with the Silver Wind chefs.


Spend a relaxing free evening on Wednesday at sea on **September 13th** aboard the Silver Wind. You can have dinner with friends at one of the restaurants on board or enjoy a cozy dinner in your stateroom.

This is our final evening at sea as we set sail from Naples to Rome with our own "La Festa Napoletana" — a unique celebration of Neopolitan's unique music and dance!

Saturday, **September 16th** will be our first evening in the Eternal City of Rome and we have planned a very special evening reflecting Italy's rich artistic history.

We say "Arrivederci Roma" on Sunday evening September 17th during closing ceremonies in the Pantheon. The last night's social event will be celebrating the glory of the past with food, music and dancing at the Villa Aurelia on the Janiculum Hill overlooking Rome. Say a special goodbye to your friends as you enjoy the Villa's many terraces and gardens.









ANCIENT BUSINESS: COMMERCE IN THE CLASSICAL WORLD

In the world of ancient Greece, cities depended on agriculture as the economic basis of their prosperity. Farming was regarded as an honorable profession. Wealthy Athenian owners of large estates employed slaves or freedmen, while smallholders worked their land together with their families and perhaps one or two slaves. Furthermore, only full citizens could own land. Commonly traded commodities included high-quality food products. In the 3rd century BC, an Indian king wrote to the Athenians asking for "some syrup of grapes, some figs, and a philosopher." The Athenians sold him the first two items but not the third. "It is illegal," they said, "to trade in philosophers." Payment was made in metal coinage, which had been invented around 700 BC in Asia Minor.

Trade in manufactured goods increased over time. The two chief categories produced were fine decorated pottery, often containing wine, oil or perfumes, and weapons, produced in small workshops run by the owner and two or three slaves. The largest production facility we know of in 5th century BC Athens was a shield factory owned by a resident alien, employing 120 slaves. The only economic activity requiring large numbers of workers was mining. The silver mines of Laurion, southeast of Athens, were under state ownership. Small operators leased small sections and worked them with slave labor, paying royalties on their finds to the Athenian treasury. Several thousand slaves worked 10-hour shifts und

erground; the time has been calculated from the capacity of their oil lamps.

The Greek city-states developed overseas markets by setting up trading posts abroad, and warehouses and residential quarters have been found in Syria, Egypt and Italy. Among the leading Greek centers in the Western Mediterranean was the Sicilian city of Syracuse. The Etruscans, a people of central Italy, were among the most enthusiastic customers for Greek works of art. One Etruscan city, Tarquinia, even encouraged a Corinthian manufacturer, Demaratus, to set up a factory there. He married a local woman and developed a thriving business.

With the death of Alexander the Great in 323 BC, and the spread of Greek culture throughout Asia (an age known as the Hellenistic period), specific cities became famous for their industrial production, Tyre for its dye-works, Tarsus for its linen.

Rome, too, was originally an agricultural community, but by around 200 BC, with most land in the hands of wealthy estate owners, and displaced peasants and veterans from the wars streaming into Rome, the large number of workers made industrial production profitable. The new class of successful businessmen was quick to put their profits to work. Shareholders invested in companies that put in bids for publ ic contracts: roads, transport, feeding of troops, and new law courts. Others imported luxury goods from the provinces, to meet the insatiable demand at Rome, while transport companies — by land and sea — handled the growth in trade. The result was to create jobs for the urban poor: stevedores, road workers, warehouse staff.

By the time of the Roman Empire, the Romans' control of the entire Mediterranean area favored an even greater spread of commerce, leading to widespread economic prosperity. With the Empire won, the Roman navy had little fighting to do, and its main duties were to accompany convoys of goods and keep the seas free of pirates. Ease of shipping led to improved harbors and canal systems, which in turn encouraged extended road networks. In the reign of Augustus (ruled 31 BC ~ AD 14), trade with India began to open up, and Asian businessmen became the chief traders between the Indian market and Rome. In northern Europe, Gallic and German traders were the leading commercial forces. Another major factor in the spread of commerce was the development of an international banking system, which facilitated currency exchange. Banks accepted deposits, on which they paid interest. Private individuals functioned as money lenders. At Pompeii, the moneylender Faustilla signed loan notes, charging 45 percent interest a year. Merchants transferred credit from one country to another to pay for goods without having to move cash. The use of Roman currency



remained widespread, but in certain periods its value began to fluctuate. Nero (ruled 54-68) was the first ruler to devalue the standard coinage by adding less valuable metals, and the practice grew over time.

There was a price to pay for the stable economic conditions throughout the Roman world: recession in Italy. As prosperity spread, the provinces no longer needed to import goods; it was cheaper to make them or buy them locally. Even the State often saved money by feeding and equipping its troops on duty in the East with supplies bought on the spot rather than shipping them in from Italy. Furthermore, Italian manufacturers could not fight back by undercutting Asian prices because Italy lacked many basic raw materials. Egypt maintained its monopoly on papyrus, Spain on steel, and Asia on glass. Thus, paradoxically, the richer the Roman Empire grew, the more trade and industry in Italy declined. Nor were Italian farmers in much better shape. Olive oil produced in Spain and Greece was often of better quality, while grain producers in the Crimea and Ukraine could supply Roman military settlements in the East more cheaply than the farmers back home. Over time, the shift of prosperity away from Italy to the great cities of Asia was to lead to the foundation of a new Eastern capital at the old Greek colony of Byzantium, named by its founder, Constantine the Great (ruled 306-337), Constantinople. When Rome and its Empire finally collapsed (the traditional date is 476), and the western provinces fragmented, Constantinople continued the cultural and commercial traditions of the Classical world in the form we know as the Byzantine Empire.



A native of England, John Reich was trained as a classical archaeologist, and did his undergraduate and graduate work at the University of Manchester. He has been living and teaching in Italy since 1970, and is currently associated with the Syracuse University study program in Florence. John lectures frequently in Europe and America, and is a regular study leader for Smithsonian tours; he has taken part in other YPO and WPO events in Italy. He is the author of many articles and several books, including Italy Before Rome and the best-selling Culture and Values (jointly written with Lawrence Cunningham), which is now in its 6th edition. He lives in a medieval castle in the Tuscan hilltop town of Panzano in Chianti.

GREEK ALPHABET

The Greek alphabet is an alphabet that has been used to write the Greek language since about the 9th century BC. It was the first alphabet in the narrow sense, that is, a writing system using a separate symbol for each vowel and consonant alike. It is the oldest alphabetic script in use today. The letters are also used to represent numbers - Greek numerals - in the same sorts of contexts as Roman numerals. Today, its letters are used as symbols in mathematics and science, particle names in physics, as names of stars, in names of fraternities and sororities. in the naming of supernumerary tropical cyclones, and for other purposes. According to legends recounted by Herodotus, a Phoenician named Cadmus, who also figures in other Greek mythology, first introduced the alphabet to Greece. Historically, the alphabet originated as a modification of the Phoenician alphabet and in turn gave rise to the Gothic, Glagolitic, Cyrillic, Coptic, and possibly the Armenian alphabets, as well as the Latin alphabet.

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

WPO Company Catches Obama's Eye; Receives Worldwide News Coverage

"The way I see it, the first job of my administration is to put people back to work and get our economy moving again," then President-elect Barack Obama told workers at Cardinal Fastener & Specialty Co. in Bedford Heights, Ohio just four days before his inauguration as the 44th president.

With less than 48 hours to prepare for the arrival of President-elect Obama and an international media entourage, Cleveland WPOer John Grabner quickly e-mailed Kathy Obert (YPO Cleveland) for help.

As the president of Cardinal Fasteners & Specialty Co., Grabner heads a company that manufactures high-strength bolts for building bridges, power plants, oil field equipment and more. His area of expertise is fastening together structures like the Golden Gate Bridge – not managing a major media onslaught.

As the chief executive officer of Edward Howard Public Relations, Obert operates the nation's oldest, independent public relations firm. Maximizing media potential is her specialty.

"Because John and I were already friends and professional colleagues through YPO and WPO, there was a confidence and trust in one another," says Obert. (The two met at a joint YPO-WPO event, and Grabner subsequently hired Obert's firm to create a marketing campaign targeting the wind turbine industry.)

Grabner and Obert found themselves working together again, this time hosting one of the most watched international figures in decades. They converted an empty room at the plant with no connectivity and no heat into a "war room" and coached company executives on how to respond effectively to reporters' questions. They wrote welcome remarks and rehearsed them, dealt with reams of red tape, and worked in tandem with the presidential transition team.

"I had no idea the amount of preparation that would go into hosting this event, much less the barrage of media coverage it would attract," says Grabner. "I am grateful to Kathy and her team for keeping me on task and leveraging the event into priceless exposure for our business."

To date, that exposure for Cardinal has included more than 22,000 media hits from *The Wall Street Journal* and CNN to Twitter and YouTube; a remarkable success story for both Grabner and Obert.

"My company had the opportunity to participate in a high-profile, internationally watched event during one of the most closely watched presidential inaugurations in history," says Obert. "The fact that John and I already had a relationship through YPO and WPO was a tremendous benefit."

Proper Documentation- Passports are required for all registrants. At this time, visas are not required to enter Colombia or Grand Cayman. Visas are required to enter Panama for U.S., Canadian and South African citizens. Entry requirements change constantly, so it is wise to check with your nearest embassy or consulate before traveling to the University.

We will do our best to notify you in advance of changes in international policy. The Seven Seas staff will facilitate the visa process on board the ship prior to entering a country if the port authority requires documentation.

Climate- Expect summer-like temperatures and sunny days for much of the University. While weather patterns vary from port to port, temperatures are almost always moderate in January with lows in the 70s Farenheit/20s Celsius and highs in the upper 80s Farenheit/30s Celsius. Brief rain showers may occur, but December and January

are known as dryer months for most of the Caribbean. Trade winds ring steady sea breezes, which temper the heat of the sun.

Clothing- Casual clothing is recom-

mended during the day for education sessions, on-ship activities and most offsite excursions. Rubber soled, comfortable shoes, swimsuits, a hat, sunscreen and sunglasses are a must! Evening dress will be a mixture of cocktail attire to smart casual. Pack a jacket or evening wrap as the nights can get a bit cooler due to the Caribbean sea breezes.



Cartagena, Colombia

The shining jewel in Colombia's Caribbean crown, Cartagena is a charming reminder of colonial days that still preserves its

Spanish heritage and romantic traditions. Strolling through the crooked narrow streets of the Old City, you'll come upon palmfilled plazas and stately colonial mansions with wrought-iron



gates and balconies taking you back in time to Cartagena's genteel past. Its once impregnable fortifications still block the western entrance to the harbor and guard the Boca Chica (mouth of the bay) in which the city is nestled. Walls 40 feet high and 60 feet wide encircle this heroic city complete with underground secret passages, and seven of its nine original forts remain standing.

Family Philanthropy Project Granitos de Paz Foundation of Colombia

Executive Director Martha Elena Mogollon will take families



to a slum in Cartagena to see how the Foundation is rebuilding the health of the population and improving living conditions through biological farming and microcredit lending.YPO-WPO youth will have the opportunity to meet the local children, joining in some of their local customs and games. Colón, Panama

The second largest city in Panama, Colón sits at the Caribbean end of the Panama Canal. It was surrounded by the former Panama Canal Zone. An important port and commercial center, Colón was made a free trade zone in 1953 and is the world's second largest duty-free port. Americans working on the Panama railroad founded the city in 1850. After completion of the railway in 1855, the port overshadowed the older Caribbean ports of Panama and became quite prestigious. Three modern ports make Colón one of the most important ports of the Caribbean Sea.

Grand Cayman

This British colony 480 miles south of Miami is the largest of the Cayman Islands even though it's only 22 miles long and 8 miles across at its widest point. George Town is the colony's capital and commercial hub.

The name Cayman comes from a Spanish-Carib word, *caymanas*, or "crocodiles," although historians believe the crocodiles in reality were iguanas. The first colonists were a motley crew of shipwrecked sailors and buccaneers, including the 17th-century Welshman, Sir Henry Morgan. The civil manners of the locals today reflect their British heritage. Grand Cayman is a tranquil, slow-paced oasis perfect for YPO-WPO families!





JORDAN PRESIDENTS' UNIVERSITY

Marhaba — Welcome to Amman!

Jordan is wild, with limitless deserts where the Bedouin roam, to the mountains of the north that are clothed in green forests, to the fertile valley where the Jordan River flows.

Today we gather in the ancient city of Amman to meet with friends old and new to begin our travels through Jordan and continue our leadership journey as YPO and WPO members. We'll get the layout of the land, exploring this dynamic city's bustling streets through our offsite program, and launch our education with an overview of this vital region.

Amman is Jordan's political, cultural and economic center and one of the oldest continuously inhabited cities in the world. First settled by the Ammonites and called Rabbath-Ammon in the times of the Old Testament, this city was conquered



by King David of Israel in the 11th century B.C. and regained independence under his son King Solomon.

By 1905, the city was populated by 3,000 people and on 15 May 1923, the Emirate of Transjordan came into existence with Emir Abdullah, a Hashemite and direct descendant of the Prophet Mohammad as its leader. By March 1946, Transjordan secured its independence, and was renamed the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan with Amman as its capital, and Abdullah named as its king.


Regional Chair Letter




In July, I will be stepping down as Regional Chair to assume my new role as YPOI Board Representative. Beginning this year, MENA and Africa share a seat on the International Board.

MENA Regional Chair **Luay Abu-Ghazaleh** (Jordan) along with 13 of his regional chairs and managers met on May 4 in Jordan for the final board meeting of his term. Abu-Ghazaleh will be stepping down in July to assume his new role as YPOI Board Representative. **Samir Murad** (Jordan) has accepted to take over as the MENA Regional Chair and the Executive Committee voted unanimously to pass the decision.

Much of the focus of the meeting centered on the progress of the region in terms of membership and recruitment, strategic alliances with INSEAD and Columbia University to strengthen educational opportunities for members in the region, and empowering chapters in the region through a series of initiatives. Abu-Ghazaleh discussed the merger of YPO with WPO, as numbers will sharply increase as WPOers (ages 50-55) are converted into the membership. "Every YPO chapter will have its WPO counterpart in MENA," explained Abu-Ghazaleh. "We have to begin now to tailor our education programs and current policies to be geared to both WPOers and YPOers."



a founding member of the human rights organization Al Haq and the author of the 2008 Orwell Award winning book, *Palestinian Walks*; Saudi journalist Mansour al-Nogaidan; and Aimee Mullins, the inspirational actress and Olympic athlete who overcame having her legs amputated at a young age.

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



Safari Johannesburg, South Africa 2-6 April 2011



STAND BY SYSTEM

Once offsite confirmations are extended, should you find that you did not receive the program of your choice, keep the "stand by" system in mind. Check in at the Offsite Stand By Desk 30 minutes prior to the departure time to receive a standby number. Those who are confirmed for the event will be loaded on the coaches first and several minutes before departure, we will load any stand by spaces that can be accommodated. Wait near the offsite coach loading area of your particular event and listen for your number to be called.

USER-PAY OFFSITES

If you are confirmed for a user-pay offsite, and you do not show, you will not be eligible for a refund. If you know ahead of time that you do not want the offsite, you may sell your space using the barter system. Pick up a form from the Offsites Desk in the lobby of the One & Only Hotel and fill out your name, event, day and price of the offsite. Hand in the form at the Offsite Desk. If another member wishes to buy your offsite, he/she will contact you. Members are responsible for making arrangements to receive payment.

PROPER DOCUMENTATION

Valid passports are required for all visitors into South Africa. Visas are required for citizens from some countries; however, travelers from Commonwealth countries, Japan, the United States and the European Union do not need visas for stays of less than 90 days. Please make sure your passport is valid for at least 6 months after the time of your visit.

Important Note: All registrants are required to have at least three blank pages in their passport for the temporary residence permit to be attached by the immigration officer at the South Africa entry point. This is taken very seriously and you will not be allowed to enter if you do not have three consecutive pages in your passport.

BEFORE YOU LEAVE

Remember to let your family and business know your itinerary before you depart for the University. For your convenience, included in this packet are "contact cards" with the ledge and hotel information for you to give to those who might need to get in touch with you during your stay in South Africa.

If you have dietary restrictions, please inform us prior to your departure by sending an e-mail to askevents@ypowpo.org.

Attaching the enclosed luggage tags to your bags will ensure that our University team can easily identify your luggage at the airport to transport to the hotel and that porters will deliver your luggage to your room in a timely manner.

ARRIVAL IN SOUTH AFRICA

If you are attending a safari, you should arrive in Johannesburg on **Saturday, 2 April by 3:00 p.m.** You will be met by members of our Hospitality Committee who will direct you to your vehicle and assist you with any questions you may have. You will be transported to the InterContinental Sandton Towers Hotel for check-in

If you are participating in the Cape Town portion of the University only, the South Africa Hospitality team will greet you upon arrival at the airport on Wednesday, 6 April 2011. You will be transported to the One & Only Hotel for check in where you will receive your University registration materials, including name badges, binder with education curriculum and agenda. A special registration newsletter and custom-designed University bags will be given out.

CURRENCY

The currency unit is the Rand (ZAR), denoted by the symbol R, with 100 cents making up R1 (one Rand). Foreign currency can be exchanged at local banks and Bureaux de Change. Visa and MasterCard are widely accepted throughout the country. American Express and Diners are less widely accepted. Most banks are open Mondays to Fridays 9:00 a.m.-3:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 8:30-11:00 a.m. The following banks offer foreign exchange services: First National, Nedbank, Standard Bank, and ABSA. Various automated teller machines (ATM's) are found in every large town.

VALUE ADDED TAX (VAT)

The VAT rate is 14% and is levied on most products and services. You can have VAT refunded at a port of exit provided the value of each invoice for goods purchased exceeds ZAR 50.00 and the total value of all items purchased exceeds ZAR 250.00.

To qualify for a refund, you must be in possession of a valid passport, **valid tax invoices** and must produce the goods purchased. Please note that a receipt stating "for information only" is not accepted by the VAT authorities. The document must stipulate that it is a VAT invoice and show the amount charged. Goods are also not to be utilized/consumed whilst in South Africa and must be in original packaging.

ELECTRICITY

All electrical appliances run on 220v. Outlets are round 3-pin, 15-amp plugs. Special adapters for video cameras, chargers and hairdryers are needed and can sometimes be supplied by some hotel receptions. Various safari camps and lodges may not have 220v and may operate on solar powered 12v electricity. Remember to bring spare batteries to have charged at the lodge while out on safari.

TIME

South Africa operates two hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT) throughout the year.

DRIVING

If you decide to rent a car, here are a few tips. South Africans drive on the left hand side of the road. The speed limit is usually 60-80 kph in built up areas and 120 kph on highways. Safety belts must be used at all times. Overseas visitors must carry a valid international driving license. Talking on a cell phone whilst driving is an offense and if caught you will be fined. Most filling stations are open 24 hours a day. Please bear in mind that you are only able to pay for fuel in cash and filling stations are not self-service.





TELEPHONE

The country code for South Africa is "27" and the international access is "00."

MEDICAL PRECAUTIONS

While no medical precautions are necessary for visits to Cape

Town, those going on safari should consult a physician about malaria prevention. Most doctors and health organizations recommend taking antimalaria tablets before and after a trip into a malaria zone. For the latest information, consult the Center for Disease Control (www.cdc.gov) or the World Health Organization (www.who.org).

CLIMATE

It will be autumn (fall) in South Africa during the University — very little rain with warm temperatures — perfect for your visit! During the safari portion of the week, open-air game drives and al fresco dinners can get chilly. Blankets and rain gear will be available on the game vehicles and fire at the evening dinners to keep you warm. In Cape Town, you can expect sunny warm days and balmy nights.

PACKING

Think "light" when packing for the University, especially if you are going on a safari. Due to weight limitations on the flights into the bush, safari participants will be limited on one 20 kg. bag (44 lbs.) for the bush portion of the University (refer to the Bush Packing List below). The only bags allowed to the bush will be the safari bags provided to you on arrival in South Africa. We will be giving you your safari bag in Johannesburg upon hotel check-in to pack for the safari.

SAFARI PACKING LIST

We recommend you use the following list as a guideline for packing for your bush experience. Avoid bright colors and white. Pack primarily browns, beiges and khakis. Same day laundry services are available at all camps at no extra charge, so no need to over-pack. The camp shops always have great items of clothing and other essentials you might need.

- · Passport (Keep with you throughout the Experience)
- Name badge
- · Long pants* (2 pairs of jeans or khakis plus what you wear)
- Shorts (1 pair)
- Long-sleeved shirts (2)
- · Short-sleeved shirts (2)
- Light rain jacket or sweater
- Thick socks (2 pairs, plus what you wear)
- · Coat
- · Hiking boots
- Tennis shoes
- Swimsuit
- Sunscreen
- Sunglasses
- · Camera and extra batteries (It is advised that you know how to use the camera before the trip. We will have professional photographers at the camps who will record the event.)
- Binoculars
- Minimal cosmetics and toiletries

You will need to pack a separate bag for the Cape Town portion of the University. While you are in the bush, the bag will be transported to Cape Town to the One & Only Hotel and will be held until your arrival on Wednesday.

SECURITY MATTERS

The South Africa University Committee has planned a wonderful week for you, and your safety is the primary focus. While in Johannesburg and Cape Town, you should observe common precautions just as you would when visiting any large city. Never leave luggage unattended in front of the hotel or in the lobby. Keep all packages and handbags closed and with you at all times. If you are going out on the streets, leave your expensive jewelry, watches and extra cash in the hotel's safety deposit box or room safe. Don't stroll around the streets after dark. Always lock your car doors and keep the windows closed. Do not walk around the city looking like a tourist and keep your camera concealed and do not carry large amounts of cash. Throughout your week in South Africa, it is important that you wear your official University name badge during meals, offsites, education classes and social events.

ON-TIME UNIVERSITY

University events begin on time. Out of courtesy to the faculty and fellow members, please don't be late for classes or offsites. Latecomers to classes might not find seats, and offsite transportation will depart on time, with or without all reserved parties. Your daily newsletter will give you all the information you need in the daily agenda to plan your day accordingly.

BREAKFAST & LUNCH IN CAPE TOWN

Meals in Cape Town will be served at Reuben's Restaurant at the One & Only Hotel (breakfast 6:00-8:00 a.m. and lunch 12:30-2:00 p.m.) Except for those events that have clearly specified seating arrangements, University seating at meals is open. We suggest that you avoid sitting with members of your own chapter and instead choose to sit next to a "stranger" who may be your next best friend in YPO-WPO. If you are participating in an offsite during breakfast or lunch, a box meal will be provided for you as part of the offsite.
