Day I- It Begins A Middle East Primer Monday, 11 October 2010



Yossi Klein Halevi is an author, journalist and researcher of Israeli culture and society. Born and raised in New York in a Jewish family, he moved to Israel in 1982 with his wife Sarah. Halevi has been active in Middle East reconciliation efforts, and serves as

chairman of Open House, an Arab-Jewish educational project in Ramle. He is a fellow at the Shalom Hartman Institute, a Jerusalem-based research institute and educational center and is Israel correspondent and contributing editor of *The New Republic*.

Halevi was a founder of the now-defunct Israeli-Palestinian Media Forum, which brought together Israeli and Palestinian Journalists. His journalistic career included senior writer for the Jerusalem Report, columnist for The Jerusalem Post, and op-ed contributor on Israeli issues for the Los Angeles Times, and occasionally for The New York Times and Washington Post. His books include, Memoirs of a Jewish Extremist and At the Entrance to the Garden of Eden: A Jew's Search for God with Christians and Muslims in the Holy Land. Currently Halevi is writing a book about the paratroopers who reunited Jerusalem in the

David Lenefsky is as passionate about law as he is about art history. He is a Manhattan-based attorney specializing in civil and criminal litigation, and represents businesses before city, state and federal governments. Lenefsky's passions extend far beyond the

Palestinian exodus in 1948. After this moving discussion, we'll divide into groups to visit local Palestinian refugee camps run by the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA). During our day in the camps, we will learn more of the long journey of the Palestinians as well as explore daily camp life with our guides and through the eyes of local residents, leaders and children.

Camp Visits - Under the guidance of the UNRWA representatives, walk through the camps, meet with camp elders, visit a camp school and interact with the children and tour the UNRWA works in the camps. We'll also have a "Forum Lunch" at the camps, with food prepared by women from each camp, allowing participants time to discuss what they heard, saw and experienced earlier.

In order to participate in the Palestinian Refugee Camp visit you will need to register here. Please keep in mind that this is an all-day program and if you register you MAY NOT participate in another offsite program offered on Tuesday.

Day III- Civilization Begins The Ancient City of Petra Wednesday, 13 October 2010

On Wednesday, the University shifts to a desert caravan, moving all attendees from Amman to Petra, a remote valley basin in the heart of southern Jordan's Shara Mountains. This impressive ancient city is one of the New Seven Wonders of the World and its ornate towering pink façades, impressive royal tombs and mountain top altars will



instill a sense of mystery and drama. The excursion will be lead by the University Offsites Chair, Yassin Talhouni, with assistance from faculty members of the American Center for Oriental Research (ACOR) in Jordan.

Note: Luggage will be shipped to the Kempinski Dead Sea Resort and members will go directly to the resort at the end of their Petra experience.

Choose one of three trail walks (see descriptions below) and make your selection on the <u>Offsite Registration Form</u>. Please take note of the times as well as difficulty of the hikes when making your choices.

The Main Trail
Wednesday, 13 October
6:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m.
Start at Visitor Center and end at Qasr El Bint
Duration: 2.5-3 hours (4km)

This trail begins by taking you past some fascinating monuments carved out of the rock such as Djinn block tombs, the obelisk tomb and an ancient dam. You will make your way into the Siq, a natural narrow gorge that is over a kilometer long. It serves as the main entrance into Petra and is certainly the most dramatic way to enter. The Siq meanders gently towards the ancient city and opens onto a spectacular view of the Treasury (Al Khazna), an intricate façade that first greets the visitor. The trail then takes you past a street of facades, the theatre, a colonnaded street and ends at Qasr El Bint where you can have your lunch in one of the two restaurants nearby and browse through some of the museums.

Clay Shirky is a provocative new voice on all things Internet: economics and culture, media and community, and the open source movement. He divides his time between consulting, teaching, and writing on the social and economic effects of Internet technologies. He is an

adjunct professor at New York University (NYU) in their graduate Interactive Telecommunications Program, where he teaches courses on the interrelationships of social and technological networks, particularly how they shape culture and vice-versa. He consults to a variety of organizations on network technologies, and is an acknowledged expert on collaboration tools, social networks, peer-to-peer sharing, collaborative filtering, and Open Source development.

Shirky has spoken and written extensively on the Internet since 1996, with regular columns in Business 2.0, FEED, OpenP2P.com and his own shirky.com blogsite. He has appeared in *The New York Times, Time, The Wall Street Journal, the Harvard Business Review*, and others. In his new book, *Here Comes Everybody*, Shirky explores how open networks, collaboration, and user appropriation of content production and dissemination are upending organizations and industries.



Sarah K. Yeomans is the Managing Web Editor of Biblical Archaeology Review and the Travel Study Director of the Biblical Archaeology Society, and an adjunct faculty member at West Virginia University. Yeomans received her M.A. in archaeology from the

led academic tours of the city and greater Italy with Context Travel and taught Roman history, archaeology and art history at Duquesne
University's Rome program. She is a certified archaeological speleologist and a fellow of the Explorer's Club. Her research, in collaboration with the C.N.R.S in Aix-en-Provence, was a study of cultural and religious syncretism in the ancient Roman provinces. Her studies brought her to France and England before finally setting her in Rome in 2002. Yeomans appears as an interviewed expert on the History Channel's "Cities of the Underworld" series, has consulted with National Geographic television, and is a contributing writer at Archeology Magazine.

The Deir "Monastery" Trail Wednesday, 13 October 5:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m.

Start at the museum and basin restaurant area and end at the Monastery

Duration: 2.5-3 hours (4km)

Grade: Hard

This trail begins from the museum inside Petra, which is located next to the Basin restaurant. It leads you northwards up ancient steps and after a short walk you reach the lion triclinium, which is set in a small side wadi on the left. Continue up the carved stairway to reach a hermitage with chambers excavated in the rock and decorated with many carved crosses. You'll make your way upwards to reach Ad Deir, which is a short way beyond and offers a fantastic view over the area.

High Place Trail
Wednesday, 13 October
6:00 a.m.- 7:00 p.m.
Start at Siq exit and end at Qasr al-Bint Temple
Duration: 3-3.5 hours

As its name suggests, the High Place sits high above the main area of Petra and getting there involves a steep climb, but the views you will have are certainly rewarding. The trail begins shortly after the exit from the outer Siq where you will climb up ancient Nabataean steps. At the top you can stop to take in the magnificent panorama before turning right to descend to Wadi Farasa to see the Lion Fountain, Garden Triclinium, Roman Soldier Tomb, Renaissance Tomb and Az Zantur excavation.

Day IV- Connectivity Begins Modern Life and the Middle East Thursday, 14 October 2010

On Thursday, we will shift gears to pursue a deep look at modern life in the Middle East. Led by expert authorities as well as YPO members and spouses from the region, we will examine



the role of women, the future of Islam, the regional business climate, how faith influences understanding, and the role that technology and social media are playing in transforming societies in the Arab world. This engaging day features world class thinkers on the forces shaping our world and the direction we are all headed, with a focused view on the role the dynamic Middle East will play in shaping the future. Because of the previous day's demanding travel and long hours, we will have an afternoon start on Thursday beginning our program at 1:30 p.m. with smaller, optional education sessions held from 10:00 a.m. to Noon.
